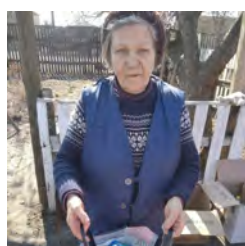
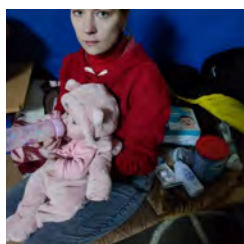
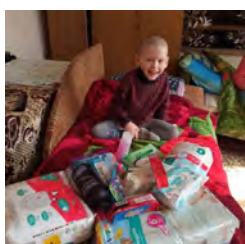


UKRAINE COLLECTION

Students told staff their funniest jokes and if it made them laugh they received a house point.

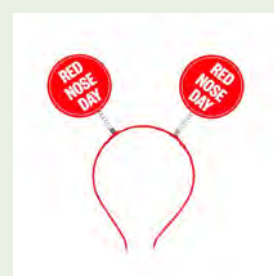

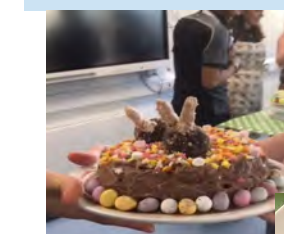

SPANISH TRANSLATION BEE

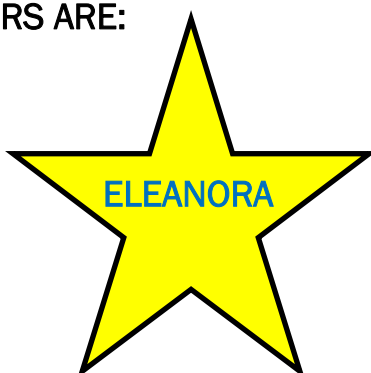


The following students took part in Stage 2 of the Spanish Translation Bee competition on Wednesday 9th March.

V & A INNOVATE TRIP



Team Moffle (Year 7), finalists in the prestigious V&A Innovate National Schools Challenge for year 7, 8, 9, travelled up to London this month to pitch their idea to a panel of judges, V&A staff, and the other selected teams.

The standard was set very high from the beginning, but when it came to their turn, Ollie, Freya, Lily, Ben and Maxwell acquitted themselves brilliantly, pitching to a packed Sackler auditorium (Ollie even cracked an off the cuff joke that raised a laugh!).

The atmosphere was great, very supportive and rightly celebrated each team's contribution to the day. There were awesome cakes afterwards, inexplicably turned down by some of our students.

Although Watling came away with no award this time, being selected as finalists was a fantastic achievement in itself. The judges expressed their admiration for all participants, one judge moved to tears by the courage of students who overcame nerves to step into the spotlight and engage an audience with their amazing ideas. Time constraints meant that we didn't have the time to fully experience the museum before heading home, but students did participate in two workshop sessions led by V&A staff, who introduced students to some of the collection.

YOUNG WOMEN IN STEM/CYBER

On Wednesday 23rd of March, Miss Willetts and I had the great privilege to escort 19 of our year 7 and 8 girls to the National Museum of Computing at Bletchley Park. The day was centred around Cyber challenges and team work to hopefully inspire young women in STEM related industry and education.

Our first session was around Cyber Security and how cyphers can be decoded. We started with a simple Caesar encryption and moved onto using letter frequencies (e is the most commonly used letter in the English language followed by t) as a way of cracking codes. Extremely apt challenges at Bletchley Park. A simple Caesar encryption works by shifting letters along in the alphabet. For example: An "A" might shift letters to become an "E" with "B" shifting to "F". Our girls were "FVMPPMERX"!

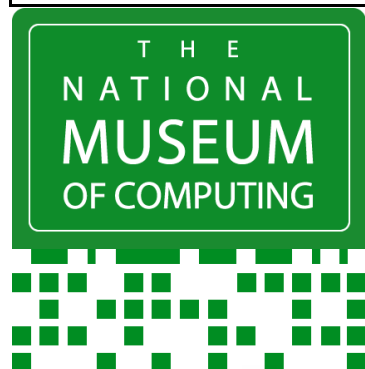
Our second session took place in the Tunny Room at Bletchley Park and involved cracking codes in teams to prevent a computer virus escaping. Again, our girls were amazing and the instructor for the session commented on the speed and accuracy at which our Watling Academy students solved the problems.

In our third session the girls were looking at and handling the hardware that we use in computing for storage and processing. We learned about HDD and SSD types of storage and also looked at streaming versus downloading including the environmental impact of using broad bandwidth and data rich streaming. Did you know...? Turning off the camera in a video call saves 96% of the energy and carbon emissions generated. That means if you are having meetings with your pyjamas on and the camera off – you are not being unprofessional – you are saving the planet!

After a glorious picnic lunch outside in the sunshine our girls were then challenged to find out about women in computing. This was a fun challenge where they were given the run of the museum with tablets and clues to find and questions to answer. When the girls had beaten the previous schools to do this challenge some of them got to have a play on the old PC and gaming machines in one of the museum's display rooms. I am probably the only one old enough to remember playing Manic Miner on a ZX Spectrum. Following on from this the students worked with the RAF to complete a team challenge to construct a model communications tower ensuring that the dishes were both high enough and far enough apart to be successful.

Some of us had to return to the academy at this point, but those that remained behind worked with the staff on trying to address the gender imbalance that currently exists in many industries. Our girls were commented on about their "forthright opinions and ideas". Again, well done!

Thanks for this wonderful experience must go to the National Museum of Computing for hosting a truly inspiring and challenging day but mostly to our girls who rose to the challenges and showed what wonderful students we have at Watling Academy.

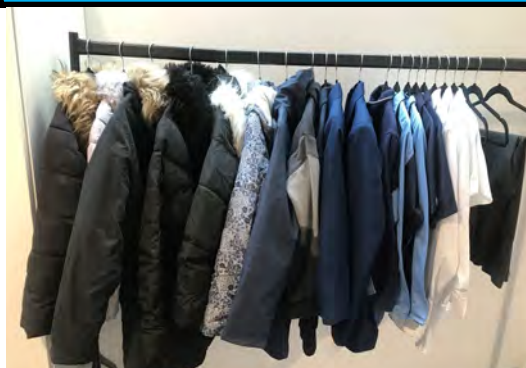
