Q4: Refer to Source A and Source B. Compare how writers convey similar perspectives on (people/places/ideas). **AO3: 16 marks**

Writing to argue/persuade/explain Q5: Example task:

'Young people need to be more involved and take more responsibility in their communities' Write a letter to your local MP (politician) in which you give your perspective on this statement.

Assessment Objectives:

AO1 – Identify and interpret explicit and implicit information and ideas. Select and synthesise evidence from different texts.

What can I revise?

For Q5, go back over the features of writing to argue and persuade:

DAFOREST D – Direct address (second person pronoun) A – Alliteration/Anecdote F - Fact O - Opinion R – Rhetorical question (interrogative)/Repetition E – Emotive language (pathos)/Exaggeration (hyperbole) S – Statistic/Simile T – Triples (tri-colon sentence).

For the reading questions, practise reading and understanding non-fiction texts such as: newspaper and magazine articles; blogs; letters; diary entries and autobiography; travel writing and speeches. You should also revise and refresh your knowledge of language methods, such as: adjective / verb / noun/adverb/pronoun; metaphor; personification; alliteration; sibilance; hyperbole; repetition; rhetorical question; juxtaposition; oxymoron; interrogatives; imperatives; exclamatives; declaratives;
